Heart disease is the leading cause of death in Wisconsin. One in three Wisconsin adults has hypertension (HTN), and over (52%) do not have their HTN under control. HTN prevalence and cardiovascular disease (CVD) deaths present an urgent need for Wisconsin. This symposium is a "call-to-action" for all Wisconsin heart health partners, and will focus on collective action to detect, control, and prevent HTN and CVD through shared, evidence-based strategies.
