1A	End Stage Renal Disease Care and Treatment	Paula Stelsel, BSN, RN, CNN - <i>Nursing Coordinator</i> Joseph Narance, RN - <i>Nursing Supervisor – Dialysis</i> Anita Popp, RN, BSN, NCCHC - <i>Nurse Clinician 4/Peritoneal Dialysis</i> <i>All at WI DOC, Bureau of Health Services</i>	This presentation will provide an overview of End Stage Renal Disease. ESRD is highly prevalent in the correctional setting and nationwide. ESRD affects many body systems and requires ongoing medical intervention, oversight, education and collaboration of a multidisciplinary team. This presentation will address the role of the nurse in caring for patients with ESRD, distinguishing between corrections and community settings, and discuss what nurses should know about the care of dialysis patients, both before treatment and after.

For each tragic loss of life, there is an opportunity to learn, implement change, and save lives. This presentation takes a psycholegal approach, describing scenarios involving suicide by incarcerated persons and the ways that delivery of healthcare can be adjusted to prevent such outcomes and reduce the potential for legal action. Although care will be taken to protect the identity of persons involved, real cases will be reviewed, and case analyses will be presented.

You will learn about the signs and symptoms of opioid misuse and abuse, and how medication-assisted treatment (MAT) is being implemented in Wisconsin. We will also explain how Wisconsin has used various funding sources and grants to respond to the epidemic.

<b>3C</b>	<b>From Crappy to Happy: A Wellness-Based Approach to Fighting Burnout</b>	<b>Dr. Julia M Persike, PsyD, CSAC</b> - <i>Independent Speaker, Trainer and Consultant</i>	Stress. Cynicism. Hopelessness. Exhaustion. Depression. Anger. The symptoms of compassion fatigue (professional burnout) vary by person and can lead to skewed professional judgement, apathy/indifference, and chronic medical conditions (Mathieu, 2007). Whether experienced by a social worker, nurse, law enforcement officer, or supervisor, burnout is an unavoidable, yet fully manageable condition experienced by professional helpers. Tasked with providing care and supervision, professional helpers often unknowingly wear stress and burnout like a badge of honor. This session will explore the historical roots of burnout, secondary trauma, and correctional fatigue. Participants will learn how burnout impacts individuals and entire departments. Participants will also examine practical, wellness-based prevention methods and coping strategies. Lastly, participants will walk away feeling refreshed, empowered, and ready to return to their vital role of professional helper.
