Therapy Dog

- Visit hospitals, prisons assisted living centers, homeless shelters with my dog
- Test / observe teams for the Alliance of Therapy Dogs
- Educate new therapy dog teams

Dogs in Prison

- Teach inmates how to raise, train and care for service dog puppies
- Foster goal setting & collaboration among program participants
- Instruct Dog Training Certificate program at OSCI for FVTC

Dog Training Instructor

- Teach people to train their pet dogs
- Help disabled individuals to work with their service dog
- Coach facilities to leverage a dog at their organization

Terminology - Animal-assisted Interventions

broad term that is now commonly used to describe the utilization of various species of animals in diverse manners beneficial to humans

Animal-assisted therapy (AAT)

Goal directed intervention in which an animal meeting specific criteria is an integral part of the treatment process

delivered and/or directed by health or human service providers working within the scope of their profession

Animal-assisted education (AAE)

planned and structured intervention with specific academic or educational goals


directed and/or delivered by educational and related service professional

Animal-assisted activities (AAA)


provide opportunities for motivation, education, or recreation to enhance quality of life


delivered in a variety of environments by specially trained professionals, paraprofessionals, or volunteers in association with animals that meet specific criteria

Designing the Interaction

Walk By – room to room or person to person


- Very short interaction with many people
- Informal and discussion is unstructured
- Good for people tentative about participating

Small group of patients with a dog & handler

- Generates interaction between group members
- Provides a common experience for after the interaction
- Stronger personalities can dominate the discussion

Focused – handler, dog, patient

- Allows focused discussion
- Likely more meaningful contact
- Less patients interacted with in the same time period



Therapy Dog Organizations




AKC does not certify therapy dogs; the certification and training is done by qualified therapy dog organizations.

Canine Good Citizen (CGC) is not the same as being a registered therapy dog team.

Therapy Dog Organizations



- Age of dog
- Duration handler has interacted with dog
- Background check
- Annual health check of dog
- Annual handler recertification
- Handling assessment of the dog
- Observation of 3 therapy dog visits



- Length of leash

sharing smiles and joy~ www.therapydogs.com

- Leash held by handler
- Distance between dogs
- Size limits for dogs on patient beds

Benefits to your organization

- Dog and handler have been assessed
- Ongoing health checks
- Insurance as long as team follows guidelines of their organization

Example

Goal

Treat symptoms related to trauma, anxiety and depression

Decrease loneliness and improve selfesteem

Maximize number of people who interact with the dog during the visit

Design

Animal-assisted activities (AAA)

Design interaction so that either dog/handler can quickly move room to room or have groups of people in centralized areas to reduce travel time between individuals

Dog / Handler

Limit duration of visit based on dog's stamina

Dog may need to be comfortable in large groups of people

Do not need exceptionally high skill level from the dog

Example

Goal

Decrease loneliness and improve self-esteem

Increase verbal communications

Design

Animal-assisted activities (AAA)

Small group interaction with dog

You may want to require pre-work to be able to participate


Dog / Handler

Handler will need more education on proper protocols for discussion topics


Assistance from a staff member to encourage group discussion

Dog skilled in working with everyone in a group

Miscellaneous Considerations

- ✓ Consider using the session as a reward don't hesitate to require pre work before a session
- ✓ Try to find ways to have the sessions help your staff
- ✓ After the session is over, find ways to keep it "alive" for the participants
- ✓ Don't forget to allow time for staff to interact with the dog
- √ Manage the duration of the session so that the dog does not become fatigued and lose interest
- ✓ Be gentle with your handler/dog teams they are volunteers
- ✓ Be prepared if a dog will not interact with a particular person
- √ Other.....
