Share research findings of a pilot study from “Walking a Tightrope” project. Review and apply ethical principles and ANA Standards of Nursing Practice to correctional health environmental situations by using case study examples that challenge nurses and other correctional staff.

Moving Upstream with Data and informed by People with Lived Experience in Correctional Systems	Ruth Johnson Cronje, PhD - <i>Professor Emerita, Rhetorics of Science and Technology Program and Honors Program, UW-Eau Claire</i> Pamela Guthman, DNP, RN-BC, APHN-PHN - <i>Director/Owner, Guthman Consulting, LLC</i> Kelly Mahoney, BA student - <i>Administrative Assistant, EXPO of WI</i> Nycki Wallsch - <i>Peer-Counselor, FREE of the Chippewa Valley/EXPO of WI</i>	This session will report both quantitative and qualitative data captured from incarcerated individuals in three counties in West Central Wisconsin to inform systems change in incarceration practice. Using standardized screening tools as well as interview scripts generated by preliminary data, a collaboration of UW—Eau Claire faculty (Guthman, Cronje) and their undergraduate research mentees investigated individuals' history of ACEs and their resilience. In addition, a community-based participatory research approach incorporated interviews and a photo-voice approach to raise awareness about the gaps and resources needed to support people as they return to their community after having experienced incarceration. Themes were identified from the interviews that were informed by and contributed to our understanding of the lived experiences of people who have been personally affected by incarceration. These projects were conducted in partnership with members of EXPO (Ex-Incarcerated People Organizing) and FREE (Reclaiming Women's Freedom of the Chippewa Valley), Chippewa Valley Justice Action Team, as well as staff in the counties' Departments of Justice and the Eau Claire Department of Human Services.
