We will discuss implications, risk factor reduction, and related medical therapy as indicated. Case studies, tips and pearls for management are included. Participants will be able to: • Recognize lower urinary tract symptoms (LUTS) associated with Benign Prostatic Hypertrophy • Understand treatment options • Understand when symptoms warrant intervention and/or further evaluation • Identify men at risk for postoperative urinary retention
